### ***Recycling Do's and Don'ts:***

DO:

Remove lids from glass items  
 Remove the liner from cereal boxes  
 Open junk mail before discarding  
 Check wax cartons before disposing

DO NOT RECYCLE THE FOLLOWING:

Styrene plastic  
 Pizza boxes  
 Plastic bowls from carryout salads  
 Black plastic  
 Plastic bags  
 Batteries  
 Plastic wrap  
 Plastic utensils  
 Garden pots  
 Strawberry baskets  
 Plastic tubes  
 Carry out coffee cups  
 Photos  
 Address labels sent from charitable organizations  
 Covid masks  
 Dirty diapers  
 Bubble wrap  
 Small bottle caps  
 Solo cups  
 Chains  
 Aerosol containers

Be sure to check with your local township for complete specifics as each area may have different regulations. Remember, recycled items go through a conveyer system so small items and things that can entangle the system should not be included. When in doubt, contact your local disposal company.
